- **Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grants**

Short Title: SPF SIG

The SPF SIG program is one of SAMHSA's Infrastructure Grant programs. SAMHSA's Infrastructure Grant programs support an array of activities to help grantees build a solid foundation for delivering and sustaining effective substance abuse and/or mental health services. The SPF SIGs, in particular, will provide funding to States to implement SAMHSA's Strategic Prevention Framework in order to:

1. prevent the onset and reduce the progression of substance abuse, including childhood and underage drinking,
2. reduce substance abuse-related problems in communities, and
3. build prevention capacity and infrastructure at the State and community levels.

Eligibility: This program is intended to help States enhance the prevention infrastructure and service delivery system throughout the State. Applicants for the SPG SIG must have the ability to leverage and coordinate all prevention-related sources of funding and other resources in order to achieve the goals of the Strategic Prevention Framework. Therefore, eligibility for the SPF SIG is limited to the immediate office of the Governor in those States and Territories that currently receive the SAPT Block Grant.

- **Substance Abuse Treatment and Reentry Services to Sentenced Juveniles and Young Adult Offenders Returning to the Community from the Correctional System**

As authorized under Section 509 of the Public Health Service Act, SAMHSA/CSAT announces the availability of Fiscal Year 2004 grants to expand and/or enhance substance abuse treatment and related reentry services in agencies currently providing supervision of and services to sentenced juvenile and young adult offenders returning to the community from incarceration for criminal/juvenile offenses. Applicants are expected to form stakeholder partnerships that will plan, develop and provide community-based substance abuse treatment and related reentry services for the targeted populations. Because reentry transition must begin in the correctional or juvenile facility before release, funding may be used for limited activities in institutional correctional settings in addition to the expected community-based services.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are domestic public and private nonprofit entities; for example, State, local or tribal governments; public or private universities and colleges; courts; community- and faith-based organizations; and tribal organizations may apply. The statutory authority for this program prohibits grants to for-profit organizations. While units of government may apply, they may not submit "pass through," "umbrella," or "cover letter" applications. This means that as the applicant, a unit of government must take an active role in the oversight of the project, coordinate with the treatment services providers, and be legally, fiscally, and administratively responsible for the grant.

The purpose of NCTSI – Community Treatment and Services Centers grants is to improve treatment and services for all children and adolescents in the United States who have experienced traumatic events and to increase access to effective trauma treatment and services.

Eligibility: Eligible Applicants are limited to CTSCs (Category III grantees) funded in FY 2001 under the NCTSI. These eligibility criteria supersede the criteria specified in Section III-1 of the BPPI-04 PA (MOD).

SAMHSA/CMHS is currently funding four cohorts of CTSC grantees with different start and end dates, as well as different project periods. By funding the original cohort of grantees for an additional year, SAMHSA/CMHS will: 1) enable the original cohort of grantees (whose funding is coming to an end) to continue the positive work they have started; and 2) bring three of the four cohorts of grantees to a common developmental endpoint. This will set the stage for grantees in those three cohorts, along with other providers in the field that have not yet received funding, to compete in FY 2005 for National Child Traumatic Stress Initiative grants.

SAMHSA's Infrastructure Grants provide funds to increase the capacity of mental health and/or substance abuse systems to support programs and services. SAMHSA's State Mental Health DIG program is intended to fund State Mental Health authorities to develop or enhance their data infrastructure to improve management of mental health service delivery. The Data Infrastructure Grants are also a link in CMHS's ongoing efforts to implement the President's New Freedom Commission in building community systems of care.

Eligibility Requirements: Eligible Applicants are limited to State Mental Health authorities in the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. Territories. A central goal of the State Mental Health DIG grants is to address State mental health planning efforts, particularly in addressing data collection for the Community Mental Health Services Block Grants (CMHSBG) as they transition to PPGs. Only the State Mental Health authorities are eligible for the CMHSBG. Additional information regarding program requirements and applications formatting requirements is provided in the INF-04 PA (MOD) in Section III-3. These eligibility criteria supersede the criteria specified in Section III-1 of the INF-04 PA (MOD).

- **Child and Adolescent Mental Health and Substance Abuse State Infrastructure Grants**

The purpose of SAMHSA's Child and Adolescent SIG is to strengthen the capacity of States, territories, and Native American tribal governments to develop, expand and sustain substance abuse and mental health services including early intervention, treatment, and/or continuing services and supports at the local level for children, adolescents, and youth in transition, who have a serious emotional disturbance, substance abuse disorder, and/or co-occurring disorders, and their families. Applicants are expected to use grant funds to build the infrastructure necessary to promote, support, and sustain local service and treatment intervention capabilities for the target population across service delivery systems. The program is intended to provide sufficient flexibility and scope to enable States to determine whether they will focus on the entire target population or demographic/geographic subsets of the population.

Eligibility Requirements: Eligible Applicants are limited to States, the District of Columbia, territories and tribal governments. The application must be submitted by the Office of the Chief Executive of the State, territory or tribe. These funds are expected to increase capacity for Statewide and tribal wide changes that promote effective home and community-based mental health/substance abuse services across all service sectors. Therefore, investment of key state-level stakeholders is crucial to the development, sustainability and growth of effective early intervention and treatment systems. Additional information regarding program requirements and application formatting requirements is provided in the INF-04 PA (MOD) in Section III-3. These eligibility criteria supersede the criteria specified in Section III-1 of the INF-04 PA (MOD).

Eligibility: For-profit or non-profit organizations, public or private institutions, such as universities, colleges, hospitals, and laboratories, units of State and local governments, eligible agencies of the Federal government, domestic or foreign institutions/organizations, faith-based or community-based organizations. Through this Program Announcement (PA), the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) seeks to encourage investigator-initiated research to enhance scientific understanding about the etiology of psychopathology related to violence and trauma, as well as studies to develop and test effective treatments, services, and prevention strategies in this area. The NIMH mission encompasses the conduct and support of biomedical and behavioral research, as well as the translation and testing of scientifically generated information into clinical applications, interventions, and services. In the last several years, various programs of the NIH and NIMH have organized and participated in scientific meetings concerning acute reactions to trauma and risk for psychopathology, disaster mental health, mass violence (terrorism, bioterrorism), as well as exposure to domestic and community violence. This PA reaffirms the NIMH's long-standing interest concerning mental health research on trauma and victimization and also reflects recent suggestions that have emerged from the above-mentioned scientific meetings.

Research Objectives: The effects of experiencing traumatic stress, either as a witness or direct victim, are a major public health problem in the United States, with consequences of potentially severe psychological, behavioral, medical, and social dysfunction, including Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and other anxiety disorders, depression, and psychotic conditions, as well as injury and death. Gaps exist in the fundamental knowledge of psychosocial implications of traumatic stress, particularly with regard to the development of children and adolescents. It is clear that simple models about the direct effects of early exposure to trauma and adversity are incomplete. Early trauma does not equate simply and consistently to complex psychopathology. A variety of research approaches can provide needed insights into the nature, cause, and pathogenesis of posttraumatic psychopathology including: assessment and measurement research on violence exposure and its consequences, theory-guided research on risk and protective factors, studies of mediators and moderators of exposure to various and multiple forms of violence and their consequences, and basic research on cognitive processing, arousal, and memory, as well as neurobiological, neurophysiological, neuroanatomical, and functional consequences of exposure to traumatic stress.

- **Research on the Reduction and Prevention of Suicidality**

Purpose: The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA), National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA), National Cancer Institute, and the National Institute on Aging invite grant applications for research that will reduce the burden of suicidality (deaths, attempts, and ideation). While NIMH has a long-standing commitment to studying the mental health-related factors contributing to suicide risk, NIDA, NIAAA, NCI, and NIA supported research in suicidality is growing and has provided a broader perspective on the range of risk and protective factors. For this PA, mental disorders, along with alcohol use disorders (AUDs) and substance use disorders (SUDs)

and their respective trajectories, are of particular interest as they pertain to risk and protective factors and treatment efficacy and effectiveness for suicidality. The intent of the program announcement is to intensify investigator-initiated research on this topic, to attract new investigators to the field, and increase interdisciplinary approaches to developing effective strategies to reduce suicidality.

The R03 award supports small research projects that can be carried out in a short period of time with limited resources. The characteristics, requirements, preparation, and review criteria for the small grant application are described in this document.

- **Early Identification and Treatment of Mental Disorders in Children and Adolescents**

The National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) invites research grant applications for research on early identification and treatment of mental disorders in children and adolescents. In particular, this announcement intends to encourage research on disorders such as schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, bipolar disorder, major depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder, and anorexia nervosa, alone or comorbid with other common mental or substance abuse disorders. These disorders are considered to be in special need of investigation because of their chronicity, high morbidity, and relative dearth of data in children and adolescents.

Eligibility: Applications may be submitted by domestic and foreign, for-profit and non-profit organizations, public and private, such as universities, colleges, hospitals, laboratories, units of State and local governments, and eligible agencies of the Federal government. Racial/ethnic minority individuals, women, and persons with disabilities are encouraged to apply as principal investigators.
